Of Note: The Washington <u>Post</u> run an item recently regarding Chief Justice William Rehnquist's new robe. According to the <u>Post</u>: "He designed the robe himself ... after having seen a performance Gilbert & Sullivan's *Iolanthe* [by VLOC] last June in which the lord chancellor wore a similar robe."

The Story of the Opera

Venetian girls (Contadine) sing of their love for two gondoliers, Marco and Giuseppe Palmieri, two brothers who will choose brides. They choose Gianetta and Tessa, and everyone leaves for the wedding.

The Duke and Duchess of Plaza-Toro, arrive in Venice with their daughter Casilda, and a drummer-attendant Luiz, because, unknown to her, Casilda was married as a baby to a prince who is now the King of Barataria. The Plaza-Toros have come to find the king's, which is disastrous for Casilda, who has fallen in love with Luiz. Don Alhambra, the Grand Inquisitor, arrives and reveals that, years before, he had had the young prince stolen and hidden with the Palmieris. However, the elder Palmieri cannot tell the difference between his own son and the prince and inevitably mixed them up. The only person who can tell the difference is the prince's foster-mother, Inez, who is also Luiz's mother. She had been entrusted with the care of the baby prince by the King, and has now been summoned.

The wedding has taken place and the newlyweds are celebrating when Don Alhambra interrupts the proceedings to explain that either Marco or Giuseppe is King of Barataria. This pleases the gondoliers and their wives. Until the king's identity is made known, Don Alhambra has arranged for them to rule jointly, and the gondoliers leave for Barataria with fond farewells from the women they have just married but must leave behind.

At court Marco and Giuseppe reign over Barataria. They have given the other gondoliers positions at court, which is run on the principle of universal equality. The women have not been allowed entry but they suddenly arrive and a celebration is arranged. Don Alhambra appears and announces that the rightful king (whichever he is) is married to Casilda, and this makes either Marco or Giuseppe a bigamist.

The Duke and Duchess and Casilda arrive amid much splendor. The Duke is now the Duke of Plaza-Toro, Limited; and both he and the Duchess have been busy with celebrity endorsements. The problem of which brother is king is resolved by the arrival of Inez, who tells everyone that, to ensure the prince's safety, she had switched him with her son before the traitors came, and raised him as her own. So Luiz ascends the throne as king with Casilda as his queen, while the gondoliers bid farewell and gladly return to Venice and their wives.

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Under the Lights

Stephanie J. Anderson (Agitato) is in her 1st production with VLOC. She is excited about utilizing her music and theater degrees as a contadina.

Don Benson (Bocci) says "Ciac" to VLOC this winter as he plans on moving to California. He "nose" he will miss all of the friends, and family he has made along the way.

Gordon Brigham (Don Alhambra) loves doing operettas, but is better known at DC's foremost "butter artist." Ever since discovering that his medium was butter, he's been buttering canvases from Palmer Park to Embassy Row. He has recently added corduroy to his palette, though he has yet to work out all the "kinks." For his next challenge, he will write a novel a la Newt, titled "Bed Muffins."

Stephanie Brigham (Graziella) is in her 14th VLOC show and her 2nd *Gondoliers*. She is married to Don Alhambra, whom she met in this company, and teaches 1st grade.

William G.S. Brown (Francesco) looks forward to becoming a gondolier after attempts at other G&S personae. The gusto of the Italian approach may lead to a new me (Not!).

Tom Campbell (Alfredo) attributes any exuded Italianesque qualities to the influence of his totally Italian wife, **Ann**. And to plenty of pasta and red wine.

Lynne (with an "e") Claffin (Rosina), seen in 9 VLOC shows, has progressed to swooning over Giuseppe's chest, an improvement over Strephon's legs(!). She adores singing in the language of love.

Lisa Fisher (Giulia) hopes that her 1st "lead" with VLOC goes as well, and is as much fun, as her prior 2 VLOC chorus experiences of course, that is excluding the pain, embarrassment and glitter. When told to break a leg, Lisa may take them literally (the stage manager has orders to shoot her and put her out of misery!). She thanks the rest of the cast and crew for their wonderful friendship and support (you know who you are).

Fran Fleming (Cadenza), in her 4th production of *Gondoliers*, has performed in most G&S operettas over the past 23 years. She just keeps going and going and going...

Julia Frank (Fiorella), George Washington University's only singing psychiatrist, is the mother of the two fishing girls, Naomi (Natanya) and Abigail (Alicia) Graber. Naomi's day job is impressing the 4th grade teachers at Piney Branch Elementary School. Abigail, sent from Central Casting to play a 3rd grader, anchors the safety patrol at East Silver Spring Elementary.

Gaye Freese (Andante) has been with VLOC since 1991 in many capacities - performer, producer, costumer, and angel of mercy. She is especially glad to be in *Gondoliers* as it will allow her show off the Italian she learned in her voice lessons.

Shirley Friedman (Duchess of Plaza-Toro) has been with VLOC for over a century (as you might already know), but this is her 1st time doing the role of Duchess and she has enjoyed it. Shirley has 2 beautiful children - Lauren (5 3/4) and Eric (10 months) and would like to thank them for their patience during rehearsals (and the other actors as well). Shirley would like to dedicate her performance to her mother, Rosalie Santilhano – a duchess in her own right.

Tom Fuchs (Cannoli) has sung with VLOC since its 1979 Sorcerer and has sung in every G&S operetta except *Iolanthe*, *Grand Duke*, and *Utopia*. Tom, a "music hall tenor," sings with 3 other groups.

Virginia Garber (Fermata) in her 7th production with VLOC, finds binding roses as a contadina an interesting counterpoint to her duties in Public Relations at the National Zoo.

Julia Lukas Gorman (Vittoria) started her haphazard musical career at age 5 by organizing the local kids into an impromptu choir and serenading the neighborhood. This is her 1st foray into the realm of G&S and her 1st production with VLOC. Both are a joy. (Pray, what is the cause of this remarkable hilarity?!) Julia's previous experience includes Marian in *The Music Man*, Miss Jones in *How to Succeed in Business*, and Eliza in *My Fair Lady*.

Amy Kirk Guevara (Aria) is happy to be in her 1st VLOC show. Previous roles include Susanna (*The Marriage of Figaro*), Monica (*The Medium*), and Sylvanie (*The Merry Widow*). Amy recently completed a series of recitals in the DC area and is planning another series next year.

Jennifer Robertson (Casilda) has been betrothed to 4 different gentlemen in VLOC productions as Josephine (*Pinafore*), Elsie (*Yeomen*), Yum-Yum (*Mikado*), and Mabel (*Pirates*). At long last, she is particularly pleased to have the privilege of marrying her

real-life husband in *Gondoliers*. Jennifer sings professionally with the Washington Opera Chorus and as a soloist for church services and weddings. She also teaches voice lessons. By day, she works at the National Parks and Conservation Association.

Maureen Roult (Annalina) will dance a cachucha if she manages to get through this production without getting seasick, developing an allergy to roses, or tripping over a garland.

Judith Rubinstein (Chianti) is in her 4th VLOC show. When not in the chorus or assisting in scene painting/set construction, she works for the federal government, which was recently overrun by Republican fallacies.

Contadine: Country girls or peasant girls.

Dolce far niente: {DOLE-cheh far nee-ENN-teh}[enjoy your *dolce far niente*]: Italian for "it is sweet to do nothing."

Contradicente {CONE-trah-dee-CHEN-teh} [nobody contradicente}: Italian for contradicting.

Ben venuti! {ben veh-NOOT-ee}: Welcome!

Buon' giorno, signorine! {bwon DJORNO, SEEN-yore-een-eh!}: Good morning, ladies!

Short-coated [Since we were short-coated]: Dressed in infant's clothes. Since they were kids in short pants.

Hidalgo {ee-DOLL-go}: A Spanish nobleman of the lowest rank. (Gilbert slipped up here, having already told us that the duke was a grandee.)

Quarterings: The number of families included in one's coat of arms. You would need a magnifying glass to appreciate the full extent of the duke's family connections.

Limited [a company, to be called the Duke of Plaza-Toro, Limited]: A limited company is equivalent to an American corporation in that the shareholders cannot lose more than their investments if the enterprise fails.

Work [a Company... is in course of formation to work me]: To exploit, as one "works" a gold mine.


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
