The Story of the Opera

King Hildebrand is awaiting King Gama – a neighboring monarch – and his daughter, the Princess Ida, who in infancy had been betrothed to Hildebrand's son, Hilarion. Gama arrives with his three warrior sons who are strong in arm but weak in brain. Gama is an ugly, twisted monarch who enjoys being spiteful and insulting, and yet is unable to understand why everyone despises him. He has not brought the princess because she has shut herself away in a castle where she rules a women's university in which men are renounced as inferior and unnecessary. Hilarion decides to gain access to the university and win Ida's love, and his friends, Cyril and Florian, accompany him. Hildebrand, meanwhile, keeps Gama and his sons locked away as hostages.

The students at Princess Ida's university, Castle Adamant, have been lectured by Lady Psyche, the professor of abstract science, on the theme that man is Nature's sole mistake. They are then addressed by Lady Blanche, who is Princess Ida's deputy and professor of humanities. Princess Ida comes to lecture the students on the superiority of women over men. When all is quiet, Hilarion, Cyril, and Florian climb over the castle wall. Finding undergraduate robes, they clad themselves in them and in this disguise they approach Princess Ida and are admitted into the university as three young ladies. However, their scheme is discovered, first by Lady Psyche, who happens to be Florian's sister, and then by Lady Blanche's daughter, Melissa, who has never seen a man before and is extremely curious. Both women agree to keep the secret. Lady Blanche realizes that something is amiss when she hears the new students speaking with gruff voices. But Melissa plays on her mother's ambitions by persuading her that, if Hilarion succeeds with his plan, the princess will leave the university and transfer power to Lady Blanche, who believes that she should be in charge anyway. During lunch Cyril gets drunk and reveals their secret. Ida, on finding that the new students are men, reels backwards and falls into the river, and Hilarion dives to the rescue and saves her from drowning. Despite this, she has the three men arrested, only to find that the castle has been besieged by King Hildebrand and that her father and brothers are held as hostages.

Princess Ida is resolute. She refuses to yield to the attacking troops and holds the castle in defiance of their threats. But her students are apprehensive of the coming battle and they gradually back down, leaving her to stand alone. King Gama, however, suggests that the outcome of the battle ought to be decided by combat between his three sons against Hilarion, Cyril, and Florian. After Gama's sons are defeated Ida relents, seeing the futility of further struggle and, realizing at last that marriage is necessary to provide future generations, she agrees to marry Hilarion. Hildebrand is pacified and the two factions are reconciled.



Glossary

Trow {Rhymes with plow} [And his daughter, too, I trow!]: Believe.

Quarter-day [As sure as quarter-day]: One of the four days of the year when rents fall due.

Doughty (DOW-tee) [But with doughty heart]: Brave.

Dr. Watt's hymns [She'll scarcely suffer Dr. Watt's hymns]: Isaac Watts (1674-1748) was an English theologian and prolific author of hymns, his total output reaching some 600, including "O God, our help in ages past."

Sillery [And pops of Sillery]: A high-class wine produced in and around the village of Sillery in Champagne.

Triolet [Oh dainty triolet]: A poem of eight lines and a specific rhyming pattern, which starts out ab, aa, abab. Jane Stedman, Gilbert's biographer, calls attention to the verses in "Expressive glances," in which the word occurs, as being close to triolets.

Heigho-let [Oh gentle heigho-let]: Heigh-ho is an exclamation of weariness. "Heigho-let" is Gilbert's variation to rhyme with triolet and violet, and, as he so thoughtfully goes on to say, means a little sigh.

Rule of three [That's rule of three]: The routine for solving simple problems in arithmetical proportions. Given three terms in a proportion, you can find the fourth by multilplying the second and third and dividing by the first. Behold: 2 is to 4 as 6 is to X. To find X, multiply 4 times 6, then divide by 2. So X equals 12. Now try this: given that a man's brain is to an elephant's as a woman's brain is to man's, who is smarter – a man, a woman, or an elephant?

Chaos [let Chaos come againt]: Everyone knows that chaos with a lowercase c means utter confusion. With an uppercase C, however, it refers to the state of the universe before the creation, when it was even more disorganized than it is today.

Abstract Philosophy [I, madam, on Abstract Philosophy]: Theoretical approaches to the search for truth.

Trepan [And weasels at their slumbers they trepan]: An obsolete meaning of the word is to entrap, which seems more believable than boring holes in their sleepy little skulls. The saying "to catch a weasel asleep" means to deceive a vigilant person or catch him napping.

Étui {AY-twee} [Here is an étui dropped by one of them]: A small case suitable for carrying sewing equipment or toiletries.

Rule the roast: Dominate and order others about. Often mistakenly transmuted into "rule the roost."

He sailed previously with VLOC's '97 *Pirates* production as one of the lesser known mates, Humdrumion, where he perfected his own brand of listless pillaging. With great verve, he thanks VLOC for the opportunity to hang with the babes of Castle Adamant, who smell a lot better than those rogues from Penzance.

Stephanie Brigham (Junior Girl Graduate) is performing in her 20th VLOC production and her 2nd *Princess Ida*. She has enjoyed bringing her daughter Grace, born last June, to rehearsals. Never too early for musical education. Stephanie teaches first grade.

Edward Byrdy (Courtier) has enjoyed G&S since lighting a 1948 high school production of *Mikado*. He has previously been a chorister in a score of local productions and has resumed performing with VLOC following a career helping preserve lives as a hospital pharmacist.

Lynn Chen (Junior Girl Graduate) is making her first appearance with VLOC. She has performed in the chorus of the Washington Savoyards *Mikado, Ruddigore*, and *Pinafore*. She has sung for the University of Maryland Chorus, Masterworks, and the Cathedral Choral Society.

Christine Colburn (Jester/Daughter of the Plough) is new to VLOC this season. She has background singing with *a capella* groups, flying small airplanes, and running a computer hardware business.

Blair M. Eig (Arac) is in his first production with his friends at VLOC. He is a veteran of the Washington Savoyards, including such roles as Old Adam in *Ruddigore* and Ben Hashbaz in *The Grand Duke*. When not on stage, Dr. Blair practices pediatrics in Silver Spring. He thanks his everfaithful wife and family for their support.

Les Elkins (Guron), received a phone call on the afternoon that VLOC's last *Ida* opened that started off with "Well, it's the trumpet player. How'd you like to take your act on the road?" That night was Les' first time in a pit orchestra. Many shows later, he greatly thanks Tom Christy for asking.

Fran Fleming (Professor) has performed in 11 of the G&S operas, several times each, over the last 26 years with the Washington Savoyards and VLOC. She is grateful for the tolerance and kindness of the more junior cast members.

Gaye Freese (Senior Girl Graduate/Costumer) doesn't actually like the theater, but has made a devil's bargain with the company: if they let her sit up until all hours at her sewing machine, then she has to be in the shows. In order to costume *Pirates*, for instance, she had to agree to play the role of Isabel.

Lisa Freese (Ada) grew up in a trailer park, didn't learn that "Spam" wasn't a real animal 'til she was fourteen, and was raised to believe that toothbrushes were the work of the Devil. Lyle Jaffe (Courtier/Soldier) has been a loyal member of VLOC since 1978. He and his sweetheart, Donna, a VLOC romance, celebrated their 12th wedding anniversary on February 14th. May they celebrate many more.

Chartie Johnston (Courtier/Soldier) started his musical career at an early age (as a boy soprano) and has continued to a late age, including school plays, operettas, glee clubs, choirs, and quartets.

Andy Krulwich (Courtier/Soldier) has appeared as a Japanese nobleman, trial groupie/villager, and Greek god with VLOC and sometime drunken sailor, gondolier, Japanese nobleman, and trial spectator with the Washington Savoyards. His other appearances are, by day, lawyer and, by night and weekend, father to three great kids.

Linda Nadeau (Lady Blanche) began her performing career at age 4 when she stepped out of the tap line in a recital and performed an unsolicited solo routine. She has worked with AGMA and non-union companies in New England and Michigan, most recently with UMGASS in Ann Arbor.

She's done all of the G&S alto roles. She loves the demented and bizarre – hence, her favorite non-G&S role was Madame Flora (the Medium).

Adina Kazyak Ordonez (Princess Ida) is a native of Washington, DC, but spent several years in England where exposure to opera, ballet and the D'Oyly Carte fired her dramatic instincts. She began her vocal training at the early age of 12, under the tutelage of internationally renowned baritone Richard Gratton and entered the Preparatory Department of the Peabody Conservatory at age 13. Always at home with the G&S repertoire, Adina has won critical acclaim for her performances as Yum-Yum in The Arlington Players' Mikado and as Josephine in the Washington Savoyards' most recent production of Pinafore. This is her first appearance with VLOC.

Debbie Peetz (Senior Girl Graduate) joins VLOC for more fun singing and dancing with Kate, Sharon, and crew. She has also waltzed through *Die Fledermaus* at ACCT, VA, and visited Hades in VLOC's *Orpheus*. Variety is the spice of life!

John Perine (King Gama) is truly disgusted to again portray the unlovable King Gama, but the chance of doing Hilarion disappeared many years and half an octave ago. Other roles over the course of 20+VLOC productions have included the Lord Chancellor, KoKo, Bunthorne, and Duke of Plaza Toro, Robin Oakapple, Major General Stanley, Captain Corcoran, Sir Joseph Porter, Jack Point, the Lieutenant, Giuseppi, and Dr. Daly. He most recently appeared as John Styx in *Orpheus*.

Joshua Paul Redford (Florian) was most recently seen in the Washington Savoyards Mikado. However, he has appeared in other G&S productions in Connecticut. He's played several leading roles including Robin Oakapple in Ruddigore, and the ever effiminate Reginald Bunthorne in Patience. Joshua also enjoys doing dramas and has played the very challenging roles of the morphine-addicted Johnny Pope Jr. in Hatful of Rain, and the Bohemian, 80-year-old, Captain Shotover in Heartbreak House.

Kristina Reeve (Junior Girl Graduate) is making her VLOC debut. She was last seen in the Washington Savoyards production of *Mikado*.

Joe Sorge (Cyril) was last seen on stage as Leonard Merrill in VLOC's Yeomen. Prior to that he appeared in VLOC's Orpheus, Pirates, and Merry Widow. He has 25 years of local community theater experience with leading roles in Oklahoma, Annie Get Your Gun, West Side Story, Kiss Me Kate, 1776, The Fantasticks, Company, and Brigadoon. He directs the staff chorus of the National Education Association and the choir at Holy Redeemer Catholic Church in College Park and sings with The Metropolitan Chorus of Arlington, Virginia. He was also the music director for VLOC's Mikado in 1996 and Sorcerer in 1997.

Julie A. Stevens (Courtier/Soldier): VLOC performance debut, lifetime G&S lover, married and mother of a teen, DHHS secretary by day, computer consultant by night, sci-fi/fantasy aficionado, many hobbies.

Rusty Suter (Professor) is proud to begin her second decade with VLOC, a wonderful organization with a terrific cast and crew. Rusty dedicates this performance to her husband, Michael, with love and wishes him continued good health.

Katja Turner (Melissa), an alumnus of UDC and IUP, has a Bachelor's and a Master's in Music Education/Vocal Performance. She has performed as background singer for several world-renowned gospel artists such as Daryl Coley and Donnie McClurkin just to name a few. She has also performed leading and supporting roles in several community opera and musical theater productions. In addition to singing, Katja is an accomplished composer of gospel and choral music. Jenny Craley Bland (Rehearsal pianist) is enjoying working on a (to her) unfamiliar show with beautiful melody lines, although the sadistic conductor often delights in torturing her by taking accompanist-killer passages at break-finger speed.

Kerry Freese (Light Board Operator) is an avid 18th century re-enactor with the First Maryland Regiment. His wife, VLOC president Lisa Freese, insists that operetta was crucial to the winning of the late war campaigns, so he has worked on VLOC's crews for *Merry Widow*, *Pirates*, *Orpheus*, and *Yeomen* to see if she could be right.

Sharon Haugen (Music Director/Conductor) is a native Minnesotan, where she received a BS degree in Instrumental Music Education from Mankato State University and earned graduate credit in Choral Conducting and Vocal Pedagogy at the University of Minnesota. She has served as Music Director for over 30 productions, including VLOC's recent *Orpheus*, and is very pleased to be working with VLOC again. 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
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
