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Land Use Acknowledgement

Victorian Lyric Opera Company is committed to recognizing the role of indigenous and marginalized peoples who occupied the land where we now perform and who were displaced by colonization. It is our sincere wish that VLOC be part of a diverse community of creativity, sharing, and mutual respect, where all are welcome.

SYNOPSIS

Act I

It is mid-day and the villagers of Ploverleigh are assembled in front of the Elizabethan Mansion of Sir Marmaduke Pointdextre, voicing their joy at the betrothal of Sir Marmaduke's heir Alexis to Aline, the only child of an equally aristocratic neighbour, the Lady Sangazure. There is one present, however, who does not share in the general joy. Constance, the daughter of Mrs. Partlet, is downcast and confesses to her mother that she loves (vainly, it seems) the Vicar, Dr. Daly. On his appearance they withdraw and Dr. Daly sings the notable ballad, "Time was when Love and I were well acquainted," in which he laments the days now gone when, as a pale young curate, he had the adoration of the maidens of his flock. Mrs. Partlet, anxious to help Constance, comes forward and leads the conversation to the subject of marriage, but it is obvious from his replies that he looks at himself as a confirmed bachelor, and Constance is led away sobbing by her mother.

The Vicar now turns to welcome Sir Marmaduke and Alexis in weighty language, and with a touch of allegory that pleases Sir Marmaduke, who is a great admirer of the school of stately compliment, and a stickler for "blue blood." He claims that his own family is directly descended from Helen of Troy, and is all for a marriage of pedigree, regarding love as a comparatively unimportant accessory.

Aline makes her appearance and is greeted by the village girls. She acknowledges their good wishes, and her mother, Lady Sangazure, adds her congratulations. The men now welcome Alexis and the lovers greet each other with ecstasy. Then follows a stately duet ("Welcome joy, adieu to sadness") between Sir Marmaduke and Lady Sangazure, who were lovers in their young days. The stately gavotte measure is punctuated by their dreams of what might have been.

A notary has now arrived, all is prepared for signing the marriage contract. This done, Alexis and Aline are left together. Alexis does not agree with the views of his father, and, believing that men and women should be coupled in matrimony without distinction of rank, has done some propaganda on the subject. So far, however, his ideas have only been welcomed by the humbler classes. His own happiness seeming assured, he reveals his scheme for making the whole village happy. He has engaged John Wellington Wells, a Sorcerer, to administer secretly a love-philtre to all the others, which will first send them to sleep, and on their awaking cause them to fall madly in love with the first person of the opposite sex they may see who has also drunk the potion. It has no effect on those already married.

Mr. Wells is introduced in the well-known patter song, and then details are discussed. It is decided that the philtre shall be placed in a large teapot which will be used for the "banquet" to follow. Mr. Wells then proceeds to his horrific Incantation, and after the Fiends have disappeared, the villagers return, make merry, and each drinks of the enchanted tea. The act closes as, after struggling vainly against the charm, all present save Alexis, Aline and the Sorcerer fall insensible.

Act II

It is midnight, and the villagers are still lying where they have fallen. Mr. Wells, with a great sense of fitness, has had the more exalted members taken home and put to bed "respectably." As the villagers wake, each falls in love with the first person of the opposite sex visible, Constance and the Notary making one couple.

Alexis is so pleased with his success that he urges Aline to join him in drinking the philtre, in order that nothing may be left to chance. She refuses, and they quarrel. The remaining characters begin to arrive: first Dr. Daly, the worthy Vicar, who is puzzled because, in a village hitherto rather slow in the matter of marriage, he has suddenly had a request for hasty weddings from everyone -- even Sir Marmaduke. Alexis is none too pleased when he finds that the philtre has led the Baronet to fix on Mrs. Partlet, the Pew Opener. Still, he must live up to his opinions, and there is a congratulatory quintet from those concerned.

Mr. Wells, having caused the mischief, falls victim to his own spell, for Lady Sangazure, entering, sees him and at once adores him. He, on the other hand, not having drunk the philtre, does not reciprocate, and in an amusing duet endeavors to dissuade her. Without success, however, she threatens to bury her woe in her family vault.

Aline, having pondered the matter, has decided to fall in with her lover's wish, and drinks the philtre. Immediately afterwards, she catches sight of Dr. Daly and of course falls in love with him. He is delighted at his good fortune, but Alexis, coming in full of remorse, is astounded to find his embraces repulsed. Explanations ensue, and the Vicar obligingly offers to quit the country and bury his sorrow "in the congenial gloom of a Colonial Bishopric."

This is not enough, for Aline is still under the influence of the philtre, and no longer loves Alexis. They appeal to Mr. Wells, who reveals that there is one way only in which the spell can be revoked. Either he or Alexis must sacrifice himself to Ahrimanes. Argument ensues, and the issue is put to popular vote; John Wellington Wells loses and disappears into the earth to the sound of a gong.

All quit their temporary partners to rejoin their old lovers, and Sir Marmaduke, claiming Lady Sangazure, invites them all to another feast in his mansion.

COMPANY BIOGRAPHIES

Ron Anzalone (*chorus*) - has sung in choirs and done 19th century living history for decades. Now retired from a career in historic preservation and archaeology, he most recently appeared as a British sailor in VLOC's *H.M.S. Pinafore*. Ron also was part of the company in *The Pirates of Penzance, The Gondoliers*, and Offenbach's *The Brigands*. In 2022 he was John Philip Sousa in VLOC's *El Capitan* (2022), having portrayed the bandmaster since 2009 with the Marine Band and at VLOC concert performances. Thanks and hugs to my family and friends for their steadfast support.

Joshua Bates (*Dr. Daly*) - is a graduate of the University of Maryland School of Music undergraduate program in vocal performance, studying under Kevin Short and also received a degree in English. Significant roles he has performed are Frederic in *Pirates of Penzance*, Lumiere and The Beast in the musical version of *Beauty and the Beast*, Page in *Amahl and the Night Visitors*, and Javert in *Les Miserables*. Over the course of his collegiate studies, Joshua sang bass solos for the Faure *Requiem*, several Bach cantatas and, and this summer was hired to perform the Vaughan Williams *Five Mystical Songs* with the UMD Summer Chorus and orchestra. Additionally this summer, Joshua had the incredible opportunity to travel and sing the role of Masetto in Mozart's *Don Giovanni* right on the stage where it premiered - the Estates Theater of Prague!

Michael Beder (*chorus*) - by day a lawyer who works with journalists, works best on deadline, which is when he's writing this bio, assisted by a pretty stiff jorum of tea. He most recently returned from a tour on the *HMS Pinafore*, and earlier this year appeared as Older Henry/Grinder in VLOC's *Sweethearts / The Zoo* double-bill. Other favorite roles include Sir Despard (*Ruddigore*) with VLOC, and Sen. Fipp (*Urinetown*) with GGSS.

Andy Boggs (*Alexis*) - Andy holds a B.M. in Vocal Performance from UMD. Throughout his time at UMD, he sang as the tenor soloist in Purcell's *Welcome to All the Pleasures* with the University Chorale. Other concert highlights include performing as the tenor soloist in BWV 116 in UMD's Bach Cantata Series, and as a soloist in Handel's piece *"Sing Unto God"* with the UMD Chamber Singers. Recently, he portrayed Ralph Rackstraw in *H.M.S. Pinafore* with the Victorian Lyric Opera Company. Other past roles that he's enjoyed are Gomez Addams in *The Addams Family*, Brack Weaver in *Down in the Valley*, and Vincent Jones in *Street Scene*. He thanks his supportive family, friends, and cast/crew!

Stephen Brown (*chorus*) - Stephen has been singing in choirs for many years but took to the stage to 'sing and dance' for the first time (since his youth - when he played the part of 'a devil' in *The Gang Show*) with VLOC's production of Pirates in 2020. Stephen sang in the chorus of *From Paris to Vienna* (2021), *Iolanthe* (2022), *The Brigands* (2022) and *The New Moon* (2023). He also enjoys getting to use his degree in engineering assisting in the building of the sets. (He had abandoned it for many years to work as a professor of accounting.)

Miriam Clopper (*chorus*) - a rising ninth grader, is excited to participate in her first VLOC production. Miriam has never before sang an operetta, but has performed in youth choral groups and has always enjoyed singing! She is very grateful for this opportunity that was extended to her by Erica Ferguson, the director of this performance, who is also Miriam's voice teacher.

Bob Dennis (*chorus*) - A retired economist with the Congressional Budget Office, sings with Polyhymnia, a serious a cappella group! He enjoys being able to "park and bark" just for fun with VLOC's concert operas.

Peggy Dennis (*chorus*) - is a former Foreign Service Officer, chronic civic activist and sometime Scottish Country Dancer. He has sung with the Boston Symphony Orchestra, Boston Lyric Opera, Janus Opera Productions and New England Spiritual Ensemble. In addition to singing, he has produced and directed *The Mikado* and *The Pirates of Penzance* by G&S; *Babes In Arms* by R. Rodgers and *Honk!* by George Stiles. Gardening is one of his avid passions.

Alice Drew (*chorus*) - This is Alice's 10th production with VLOC. In addition to singing in VLOC choruses, she has also sung, worked backstage as a stagehand, and run spotlights for other VLOC, RMT, BP, and Hexagon productions. She is a retired government scientist and sings with the Riderwood GraceNotes. She lives in Silver Spring with her husband Ed Vilade (a VLOC tenor), and an elderly cat.

Alix Evans (*Mrs. Partlet*) - mezzo-soprano, spends much of her time interpreting early music, exploring approaches to harp accompaniment of troubadour song and Germanic epics. She is thrilled to be able to step out into the "modern era" of Gilbert and Sullivan with VLOC! Alix also enjoys working with living composers, and is a featured soloist in Tristan Latchford's "A Celebration of Women in the Bible" (Harmonichan Productions). She performs with the Baltimore-based quintet "Metal on Pavement," and is the music

director of Second Wind Chorus in Capitol Hill. She holds an MM in historical performance and vocal pedagogy from the Peabody Institute.

Les Elkins (*chorus*) - has frequently been with VLOC as a chorus member, board member, and pit orchestra player (Ah, but lately? Well...) He currently plays trumpet/cornet and sings with some half a dozen early jazz/traditional/New Orleans type bands and related styles, and is a board member for the Potomac River Jazz Club.

Erica Ferguson (*director*) - VLOC regulars will recognize Erica from her turns on stage in the title roles of *Iolanthe* (2021) and *Princess Ida* (2019). But, what you may not know is she's also an accomplished choreographer and stage director. Some of Ms. Ferguson's directing credits include *Carmen* (2022) and *Trouble in Tahiti/Gallantry* (2023) with LLO, and Signor Deluso and *Down in the Valley* (2020) with UMD OperaTerps. Marlyn Setren Ferguson (*chorus*) - is very excited to be in her second opera, and honored to be working with her daughter Erica, the Director for this show. 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
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

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John Hyde Perine

John Hyde Perine, a long-time VLOC member, passed away in May. He was kind, hilarious, gentle, and humble. John's musical talent reached far and wide in Maryland. He sang with the Victorian Lyric Opera (VLOC) and he performed countless times at the F. Scott Fitzgerald Theater in Rockville, MD as well as with the Washington Savoyards. He particularly enjoyed the silliness of Gilbert and Sullivan operettas. He knew every word of every role in every show. Truly a remarkable and memorable performer. and he performed in H.M.S. Pinafore, The Pirates of Penzance, (John sang the patter song "I am a modern Major-General" to perfection) and Iolanthe to name a few. In one production of Iolanthe as the Lord Chancellor, John wore a Chancellor's robe with gold stripes on the sleeves. Chief Justice Rehnquist saw the performance and had 4 gold stripes added to his robes. His last performance with VLOC was as Grand Duke Rudolph in Gilbert & Sullivan's The Grand Duke.



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
